Chrismons on the Tree ~ Pastor Dan Holland

Advent starts this week, which means that among other things, the sanctuary at church has been decorated for the season. Twice in the last week I've been asked to share a bit of the meaning behind the decor, and I tell you there's a lot of time and energy that has been poured into the decorations over the years. From the mosaics on the back wall to the banners at the front of the sanctuary, many of the adornments have been made by people of this congregation. And if you know what you're looking at and what you're looking for, the decorations aren't just decorations... they tell stories of our faith. A few years back we built a worship service around the Chrismons hanging on our tree. I've adapted just a little bit of that service for this Grapevine article as a way of sharing the story and hopefully sparking interest.

It was in 1957 that a woman named Frances Kipps Spencer made the first set of what we now call Chrismons and displayed them at a Lutheran church in Danville, Virginia. Our tradition of Chrismons here at MVPC started in 1976 when Debbie Parker got in touch with that church in Danville and was sent instructions and the raw materials to make our own Chrismons. Some of those first have been lost and others have been added, but every year since then Debbie and Virgil and their family have been part of decorating the sanctuary with decorations that are more than just decorations.

The word Chrismon is a combination of the words "Christ" and "monogram" and it's been adopted to refer to the ornaments that have been developed over the years to point to Christ and his life's work. All of the ornaments are done in white and gold to signify the holiness and the majesty of God. The symbols and the letters have historical significance, in ancient times they could be found on jewelry or doors to buildings, on the walls of catacombs in Rome. Early Christians used them to identify themselves to one another or to designate places where the church would gather; and perhaps even more importantly than that, people passed on their faith as they shared the meaning behind the symbols. Some Chrismons were designed to represent Christ as the cornerstone of our faith. For instance where you see the letters Alpha (A) and Omega (Ω), which are the first and the last letters of the Greek alphabet they remind us that Jesus said he is the first and the last the beginning and end. He is the one on whom everything else is built and everything else relies.

There are others which represent Christ as the light of the world. The eight pointed star was originally adopted by Christians as a "concealed" monogram during Roman persecutions. To people who didn't know, it could have meant anything but to those who had been shown, the crossing lines reveal the Greek letters Chi (X) and Rho (P) which are the first two letters of the Greek word Christos which means Christ. The fact that the symbol needed to be concealed reminds us that it's not always easy to follow Christ, but it is worth it. And with Christ, the light of the world, illuminating the way, all things are possible.

These are just two of the eighty-something Chrismons on the tree. This Sunday I'd invite you to get to church a little early or stay a little late, take a look at the decor, ponder what story is represented in what you see, feel free to ask questions and also take a moment to consider what the story of the season means for you.

Grace and Peace to you and a blessed advent too! Pastor Dan




Meet Elder Bob Mitchell


A Lectionary Experiment

MVPC is embarking on a Lectionary experiment starting this Sunday! Pastor Dan and the worship ministry team have been considering this change for about a year, and now it's time.

Starting December 3rd (This weekend!) Pastor Dan will be preaching on texts chosen from the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL)

The RCL is a collection of scripture passages selected and arranged in 1992 by a group called the *Consultation on Common Texts* which is made up of the PCUSA and 22 other denominations. The lectionary was built in hopes of bringing unity within churches and among churches and has the added benefits of exposing the congregation to texts their pastors might not normally choose to preach, encouraging a message which is "bible-applied-to-life" and making it easier for those in positions of worship leadership to plan and prepare worship services.

We will be starting with "Year B" of the RCL. Below you'll find the texts for the 4 Sundays of Advent. If you would like to learn more about the RCL straight from the organization that put it together you can find info at http://www.commontexts.org/rcl/ and if you would like to see any of the future planned readings for any given week, there are many resources available on-line and in print. The PCUSA Mission Agency version of the resource can be found at www.pma.pcusa.org/devotion/revised-common-lectionary. A SEASON OF Discernment

"Discernment is more than saying prayers that ask God to guide us in rational consideration of matters. It is a mode of prayer that involves opening our entire selves to the working of the Holy Spirit. It bids us to let go of preconceived ideas so that we can be open to new possibilities with a readiness to view things from new perspectives. Discernment beckons us to be still and listen with the ear of our heart. It draws us into alignment with God."

- Suzanne Farnham, in her book *Grounded in God*

The third of four discernment retreats led by Denise Easter and Dianna Kunce from Renewal Ministries Northwest (www.renewalminnw.org) happened on November 18th.

At the first retreat, on September 30th, all of the members and friends of the church were invited to participate as we practiced praying with the scriptures and listening for God's voice through Lectio Divina, we received an invitation to listen for God's voice daily in prayer and we heard an overview of what our discernment process was going to look like. At the second retreat, October 14th, the leadership of MVPC gathered to listen for the congregation's unique giftedness, or charism, which we articulated saying: "MVPC is and is becoming a welcoming, caring and graciously safe community because we are deeply committed to seeking Christ, listening for the Holy Spirit, and discerning God's will." We also set out to frame a question for us to put before the Lord: "Lord, what are you saying to us about nurturing and extending our charism inside and outside our church?"

At the third retreat, again, all of the members and friends were invited and over 30 participated. There were many things discussed and at least four consistent themes emerged.

- Change: recognizing that it produces anxiety and yet at the same time any gardener will tell you that pruning is an important part of fruit production, and God calls us to trust him. We may be invited to some fairly bold change.
- Focus: that as a church when we do something we want to be able to do it well so we need to be asking questions like: "Who are we called to serve?" and "How does this program fit into the mission and ministry of the church?"
- Partnerships: someone at the meeting said, "... with humility, we recognize the wheel has already been invented. Perhaps we can intentionally work with like services in the community to do lots of good."
- Education: that people within the church need to be trained and equipped. It is important for us to learn from others and we also want to be able to share what we've learned.

These don't represent action plans at this point, but they point to what we have heard God saying to us about nurturing the particular gifts the Holy Spirit has given to us and extending our charism outside the church as well.

On December 2, the fourth retreat for the leadership of the church will focus on distilling the results of the congregation's discernment and developing a plan of action that faithfully represents what we've heard from the Lord.

Please continue to pray for the discernment process and pay attention to how God is speaking to you. And if you haven't already, get involved in the ministry and fellowship of the church in ways that are going to be life-giving for you!


WHITE GIFT OFFERING


